Date: April 3, 2019

The 2015-2025 Parks, Recreation, and Open Spaces Comprehensive Plan was approved by Council in March 2015. An Action Plan was included in the document. This plan was developed by comparing the demand for recreation to the existing inventory of recreational opportunities. Since the plan's existence, the City, along with generous donations and grant funding have been able to complete multiple projects listed in the plan.

Staff would like to re-visit the Action Plan, update Parks and Recreation Board members with completed projects, and discuss priorities moving forward.

5. Presentation and Discussion Related to Aquatic Therapy at the Blue Bell Aquatic Center and Therapy Pool Rental Rates Related to Usage for Aquatic Therapy

Blue Bell Aquatic Center (BBAC) Supervisor Tammy Jaster presented this item. Jaster gave a brief history of past aquatic therapy use at the pool including daily operations and the previous fee schedule.

The BBAC was approached by a local business owner, John De Simio, Tradewinds Physical Therapy, about utilizing the therapy pool for aquatic therapy. The current request is for the business to rent the BBAC therapy pool three days each week, Tuesday, Wednesday, and

Thursday, during a designated time from 1pm-4pm. The facility is closed from 1pm-4pm during Spring/Fall hours. The Brenham School District currently uses the competition pool for High School and Junior High School swim team practices from 1pm-4pm. The therapy pool is not being used. Jaster mentioned three potential impacts for the new pool use: the usage will require lifeguards on duty from 1pm-4pm which will increase staff time, a possible increase in chemicals due to increased users, and additional revenues.

Staff presented two rental options: (1) base pay – Lessee agrees to pay to Lessor a variable scale based upon the number of uses by patients of Lessee (weekly visits) and (2) minimal rental – Lessee agrees to pay \$360 per week (\$40 per hour) minimum regardless of actual weekly visits.

Rau mentioned that the final contract will be presented to City Council, but staff is looking for guidance from the Board for recommended rates.

Jaster communicated to the Board that the BBAC receives 2-3 calls daily about aquatic therapy and the need for this type of service in Brenham.

The consensus of the board was to offer a one-year contract with a lower rental rate for the first 60-90 days. Then to increase the rate to \$360 per week for the remainder of the year with the price increasing in years two and three. There will also be an option to renew the contract.

7. Discuss and Possibly Act Upon Making a Recommendation to the City of Brenham City Council to Amend Chapter 12, Smoking in Public Facilities, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Brenham to Adequately Define City Parks as Tobacco-Free Environments

City Secretary Jeana Bellinger presented this item. Bellinger mentioned that the use of alcohol and tobacco in City of Brenham Parks was discussed at the last Board meeting on December 12, 2018.

Bellinger stated that Article 12 of the Code of Ordinances relates to smoking in public facilities. Based on feedback from the last Board meeting, staff put together an amendment to Chapter 12, Article V, Section 12-57 and 12-58 to address electronic smoking devices and smokeless tobacco, clarify current language, and strengthen the wording of the article regarding city-owned facilities to include park amenities.

Board Member Wehring asked how the ordinance would be enforced. Rau explained that compliance would be on the honor system, like other park ordinances, and if there are complaints or resistance Brenham Police Department would be contacted to enforce the code of ordinances. Bellinger elaborated that violators could be written a citation for violation of a city ordinance. Board Member Fischer questioned if there is signage at the parks regarding no smoking. Rau stated that signage will be added at the entrances to all parks notifying citizens.

A motion was made by Ginger Bosse and seconded by Jim Baker to recommend tobacco free parks to City Council.

Subject: Parks and Recreation FY2019-2020 Funding Requests

Date: April 3, 2019

Staff has identified parks and recreation projects to present to the Brenham Community Development Corporation (BCDC) for funding and is looking for guidance from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board.

The BCDC promotes economic and community development within the city and on behalf of the city by developing, implementing, providing, and financing projects as defined in Section 4B of the Development Corporation Act (Article 5190.6 V.T.C.S.). The BCDC Board develops a budget each year based on sales tax projections. The City collects a local sales tax of 1.5 cents; of that amount, 3/8 (.375) of 1 cent is dedicated to BCDC activities. Historically, the BCDC has allocated 35% of its funds to economic development activities and 65% to community parks and recreation projects.

The BCDC Board will meet April 24, 2019 at City Hall to discuss these requests. Below is a snap shot of proposed funding requests for Parks, Recreation, and the Blue Bell Aquatic Center. Items are listed in each section in order of priority. Following the snap shot are pictures and descriptions of proposed items.

(1) Parks, Recreation, and Open Spaces Master Plan – 5-year update


Price: \$10,000

Texas Parks & Wildlife Department Local Park Grant Program Parks, Recreation, and Open Spaces Master Plan Guidelines

Plans must be updated every five years to remain eligible. At a minimum, updates should include a summary of: accomplishments, new public input, most recent inventory data, updated needs assessment, priorities, new implementation plan, demographics, population projections, goals and objectives, standards, and maps.

Priorities should be updated as high priority items are accomplished and lower priorities move up. A new resolution is not required when updating priorities; however, if you change or revise your priorities, submit a new resolution adopting the new priorities.

A completely new plan is required every ten years.



(2) Movies in the Park

Price: \$4,000

This movie series brings families and children of all ages together for a fun and safe evening of entertainment. On average more than 300 people attend each event.



(3) Christmas Stroll Programming

Price: \$5,000

In addition to the popular lighted Christmas Parade held the first Saturday in December we like to offer extra programming to complement the overall Christmas Stroll experience for our residents and visitors. Previous offerings include: Snowzilla Junior, an XL inflatable slide, horse drawn carriage rides, entertainment from the Snow Sisters, and snow tubing slides.










Blue Bell Aquatic Center

(1) Resurface Leisure Pool Deck

Price: \$75,000

The leisure pool deck was resurfaced in 2012. Typically, decking surfaces last approximately 5 years. We planned to resurface the deck in 2017 but had to push the project back the last couple of years due to funding. We are now at year 8 and are at the point in some areas around the pool that we are without deck coating. This is now a safety issue as the surface is not slip resistant. The projected price is a recent quote from February 2019 for float, texture and paint new deck coating as well as expansion joint replacement.

Below you will see some photos of the current deck surface as well as the expansion joints. All in need of replacement.



(2) HVAC Units Price: \$64,000

This is phase III of replacing all original AC Units. All these units are on the top of the front desk area. This would be the final phase to replace all original units. Replacing the last 3 units together will save on crane cost as well as some labor cost bundling together. This quote was received in December 2018.





(3) Replace PUMPS for Pools

Price: \$60,000

This would buy a new pump for all three of the main systems that run the three pools. (Competition Pool, Therapy Pool, and Leisure Pool) All current pumps are original pumps that have been fixed when needed. When one goes out, without a backup pump to replace it, the pool it affects is down and out of commission until the pump is fixed or replaced. Replacing with new pumps, will allow service work to be done on all current pumps creating a backup pump for each pool, preventing down time when one goes out. This quote was received in March 2019.



(4) Replace Lounge Chairs

Price: \$60,000

When the pool first opened there were 100 lounge chairs for the visitors to lounge on. Over the years we have had to replace some of the chairs and we have had to toss some due to damage and wear & tear. Below you will see current photos of the white/blue chairs that are showing wear & tear. We are requesting funding to replace all 100 chairs with a combination of lounge chairs as well as sit up chairs (as requested by some of the elderly patrons.) We are requesting to purchase the same brand as the color benches onsite. Berlin Gardens provides outdoor furniture made of poly lumber creating a strong, comfortable piece. These pieces are hassle free with little upkeep. They are easy to care for, no need to repaint, and designed to withstand even the harsh weather. Poly is an environmentally friendly choice because it is made from recycled mile jugs.

(5) Replace Picnic Table Umbrellas

Price: \$7,500

This would replace all current picnic table umbrellas. Normally we replace them every 4-6 years. We replaced them in 2014 and are in need to replace them again. The quote is for 15 new umbrellas and was received in March 2019.




(6) Aflex Inflatables

Price: \$12,000

The inflatables that were purchased in October 2018 have been a HUGE hit. They are being used for special event days, rainy days, birthday parties, and private parties. With the success of the inflatables and the number of kids that come when they are out, we are requesting funding for additional ones so that we can have two courses up at the same time for larger kids as well as the younger kids. The price quote is for 5 additional pieces.





(7) Repaint Steel Beams

Price: \$50,000

Due to the aging facility, built in 2001, we are starting to see wear/damage on some of the steel beams and steel columns. This would be preventative to preserve the life of the facility. Steel beams and columns can be found in the front foyer, competition pool, and the therapy pool area. This is an estimated number from maintenance. We are awaiting a bid for a better budget number.

(8) Shade Structures

Price: \$45,000

This is an estimated number to replace and or add additional shade structures to the Leisure Pool area. Currently there are two shade structures that are original to the facility. One original to the facility at the top of the slide, one currently over the playground, and one over the picnic tables. The two over the benches and one over the slide may need to be replaced. If funding allows we will purchase additional structures.



(9) Bogo Mats Price: \$10,00

We asked for funding for these items in 2018 but due to lack of funds, we were not able to purchase them. We would like to request funding for the Bogo Boards/Aqua Mats. These would be used for additional aerobic classes geared towards our tweens/teens and adults. This provides a fun active aerobic workout, bringing more people to the pool.





Parks

(1) Splash Pad - TBD

Price: \$300,000

This will fit the need in our parks master plan to incorporate a unique play feature to Brenham's park system. Splash pad location is still undecided; we are currently looking at a couple possible locations and are looking for recommendations.

(2) Replace Outfield Wall – Fireman's Field

Price: \$80,000

Champion Wall system to replace current outfield fence that is showing signs of age and deterioration. Current wall was replaced in 2012. Champion Wall provides statistics of lower maintenance costs and a life cycle that is longer lasting than any other material currently on the market.



(3) Turf Mound – Schulte Field

Price: \$12,000

This mound will replace our current traditional clay mound on Schulte Field at Hohlt Park. Installing a turf mound on this field will reduce maintenance cost; provide a true pitching surface for tournaments without having to constantly repair the mound for play.



(4) Bullpen Upgrades (Phase I) – Hohlt Park

Price: \$11,000

Phase I of bullpen upgrades at Hohlt Park baseball and softball fields. These upgrades will provide a more consistent surface and reduce maintenance time and cost.







(5) Fan – Finke Pavilion, Fireman's Park

Price: \$11,550

Large fan to provide relief from summer heat at Finke Pavilion for park patrons. This fan has variable speed options, motions detection, and programmable schedule features.



(6) Playground – Jerry Wilson Park

Price: \$85,000

This will be a new playground feature at Jerry Wilson Park. Currently there are no play structures at this residential park. . Above playground picture is a placeholder for purposes of this presentation only, design and layout of the Jerry Wilson Park will be determined later.



(7) Parking Lot – Linda Anderson

Price: \$30,000

Resurfacing the parking lot at Linda Anderson Park. Current parking lot was reconstructed five years ago and needs another layer of chip seal material. This will help with vegetation control and provide a smoother parking surface.



(8) Replace Fence – Pickleball Courts, Jackson Street Park Price: \$6,000

Replacing two fences that are 30 years old and are in poor condition, this price includes new fabric and windscreen at the Jackson St. Park Pickleball courts.



(9) Shade Canopy – Pickleball Courts, Jackson Street Park

Price: \$15,000


Utilizing a cantilever shade structure to provide shade at the recently installed bleachers at Jackson St. Pickleball courts for players and spectators.



(10) Phase III – Henderson Park

Price: \$200,000

In anticipation of full scope of work not being completed in phases one and two, phase three will insure full project completion of Henderson Park revitalization.



(11) Softball Renovation – Blinn Softball, Hohlt Park

Price: \$80,000

Blinn Softball was constructed in 2001 and needs a full renovation. Currently the field sits at zero percent grade, creating a drainage issue. This past fall and winter Blinn Softball was unable to use their field for 5 months.



Scope of work to include the following:

Spray 2 doses of 3% glyphosate, strip grass off field, set forms around infield, haul in red infield mix to raise skinned area, laser grade skinned area, install soil stabilizer and 816 infield conditioner to skinned area and till, laser grade skinned area to finish grade, install 80 bags 816 to top of skinned area, haul in sand to raise grass area, till to blend soils, laser grade skinned area, roll and drag field, install Tif Bermuda Grass in big rolls, install new base anchors, pitching rubber and home plate, place mound clay in pitching area, batters boxes, and catcher's box, top dress sod after it is established, furnish new set of bases including safety bag at first base

Materials
40 bags mound clay
160 bags 816 infield conditioner
10 bags soil stabilizer
194 tons red infield mix
266.75 tons sand
Complete set of bases with double first base
4 rubber plugs

(12) Covered Basketball Courts – TBD

Price: \$85,000

Per our park masterplan and community feedback, covered basketball courts are a feature that is highly desired. This structure will provide shade and create the ability to play during inclement weather.



(13) Playground – Jackson Street Park

Price: \$85,000

This will be replacing 2 playgrounds and an outdated climbing feature currently at Jackson St. Park. This will incorporate both age ranges (2-5) (5-12) at one location. Above playground picture is a placeholder for purposes of this presentation only, design and layout of the Jackson St. Park playground will be determined later.



(14) Replace Bleachers (Phase I) – Hohlt Park

Price: \$45,000

Phase one of bleacher replacements at Hohlt Park, current bleachers need to be replaced due to age and lack of safety fencing.

Bleacher Code ICC 300 Section 408 Guards states: Guards shall be provided in the following areas —along open-sided walking surfaces, cross aisles, stepped aisles, ramps and landings of tiered seating areas which are located more than 30 inches above the floor or grade below.




(15) Press Box Upgrades – Fireman's Field

Price: \$30,000

Upgrading current press box with new logos, paint, windows, and creating a more usable interior space for score keepers and broadcasters.









(16) Replace Scoreboards – Hohlt Park Softball Fields

Price: \$22,000

Replacing current wired score boards with wireless LED boards and controllers. Current score boards were installed in 2007; these units are starting to have technical issues.



(17) Liberty Wheelchair Swing

Price: \$30,000

Wheelchair swing to be placed at the best location to accommodate children and adults in wheelchairs. This price includes the swing, surfacing, and accessible route to the swing.
